THE STATUE OF LIBERTY OF NEW YORK

INTRODUCTION

The Statue of Liberty is a colossal neoclassical sculpture on Liberty Island in New York Harbor (New York, United States). The copper statue, a gift from the people of France to the people of the United States, was designed by French sculptor Frédéric Auguste Bartholdi and its metal framework was built by Gustave Eiffel. The statue was dedicated on October 28, 1886. The statue is a figure of *Libertas*, a robed Roman liberty goddess. She holds a torch above her head with her right hand, and in her left hand carries a *tabula ansata* inscribed JULY IV MDCCLXXVI (July 4, 1776 in Roman numerals), the date of the U.S. Declaration of Independence. A broken shackle and chain lie at her feet as she walks forward, commemorating the national abolition of slavery. After its dedication, the statue became an icon of freedom and of the United States; it has been a welcoming sight to immigrants arriving by sea. Bartholdi was inspired by a French law professor and politician, Édouard René de Laboulaye, who is said to have commented in 1865 that any monument raised to U.S. independence would properly be a joint project of the French and U.S. peoples. Because of the post-war instability in France, work on the statue did not commence until the early 1870s. In 1875, Laboulaye proposed that the French finance the statue and the U.S. provide the site and build the pedestal. Bartholdi completed the head and the torch-bearing arm before the statue was fully designed, and these pieces were exhibited for publicity at international expositions. The torch-bearing arm was displayed at the Centennial Exposition in Philadelphia in 1876, and in Madison Square Park in Manhattan from 1876 to 1882. Fundraising proved difficult, especially for the Americans, and by 1885 work on the pedestal was threatened by lack of funds. Publisher Joseph Pulitzer, of the *New York World*, started a drive for donations to finish the project and attracted more than 120,000 contributors, most of whom gave less than a dollar. The statue was built in France, shipped overseas in crates, and assembled on the completed pedestal on what was then called Bedloe's Island. The statue's completion was marked by New York's first ticker-tape parade and a dedication ceremony presided over by President Grover Cleveland.

INTRODUCTION

La Statue de la Liberté est une sculpture néoclassique colossale sur *Liberty Island* dans le port de New York (New York, États-Unis). La statue en cuivre, un cadeau du peuple français au peuple des États-Unis, a été conçue par le sculpteur français Frédéric Auguste Bartholdi et sa charpente métallique a été construite par Gustave Eiffel. La statue a été consacrée le 28 octobre 1886. La statue est une figure de *Libertas*, une déesse de la liberté romaine vêtue d'une robe. Elle tient une torche audessus de sa tête avec sa main droite, et dans sa main gauche porte une *tabula ansata* inscrite JULY IV MDCCLXXVI (4 juillet 1776 en chiffres romains), la date de la déclaration d'indépendance des États-Unis. Une chaîne brisée se trouve à ses pieds alors qu'elle avance, commémorant l'abolition nationale de l'esclavage. Après sa consécration, la statue est devenue une icône de la liberté et des États-Unis; un symbole accueillant pour les immigrants arrivant par voie maritime. Bartholdi a été inspiré par un professeur de droit et homme politique français, Édouard René de Laboulaye, qui aurait commenté en 1865 que tout monument élevé à l'indépendance des États-Unis serait à juste titre un projet conjoint des peuples français et américain. En raison de l'instabilité d'après-guerre en France, les travaux sur la statue n'ont commencé qu'au début des années 1870. En 1875, Laboulaye proposa que les Français financent la statue et que les États-Unis fournissent le site et construisent le piédestal. Bartholdi a terminé la tête et le bras porte-torche avant que la statue ne soit entièrement conçue, et ces pièces ont été exposées à des fins publicitaires lors d'expositions internationales. Le bras porte-torche a été exposé à l'exposition du centenaire à Philadelphie en 1876, et au *Madison Square Park* à Manhattan de 1876 à 1882. La collecte de fonds s'avéra difficile, surtout pour les Américains, et en 1885, les travaux sur le piédestal étaient menacés par le manque de fonds. L'éditeur Joseph Pulitzer, du *New York World*, a lancé une campagne de dons pour terminer le projet et a attiré plus de 120 000 contributeurs, dont la plupart ont donné moins d'un dollar. La statue a été construite en France, expédiée à l'étranger dans des caisses, et assemblée sur le piédestal terminé sur ce qui s'appelait alors *Bedloe's Island*. L'achèvement de la statue a été marqué par la première parade avec pluie de confettis à New York et une cérémonie d'inauguration présidé par le président Grover Cleveland.

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
